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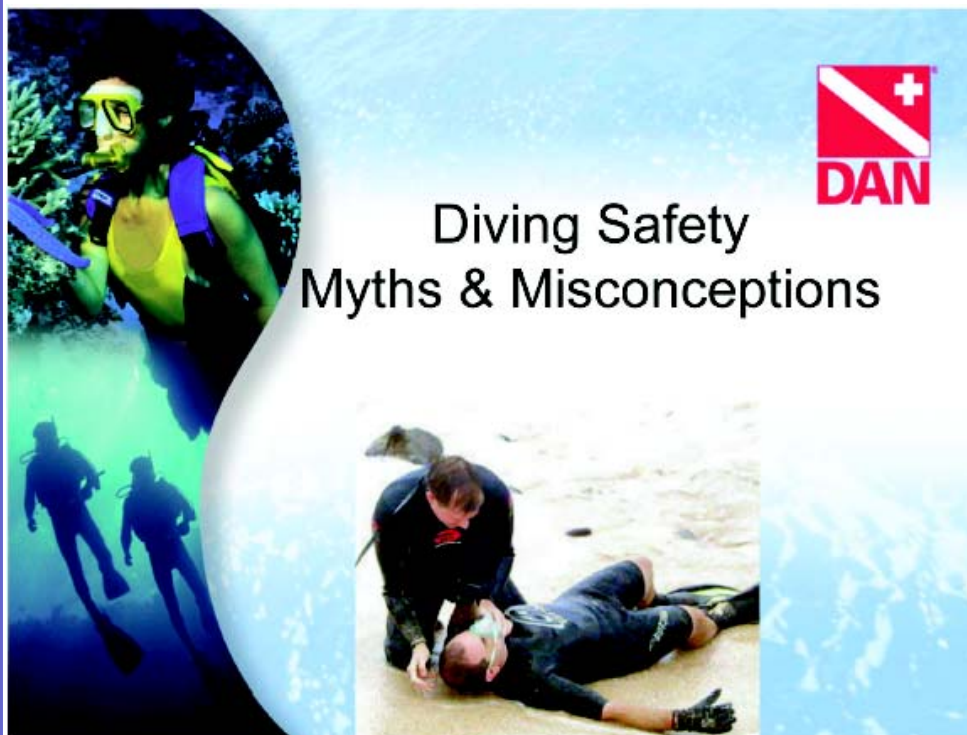
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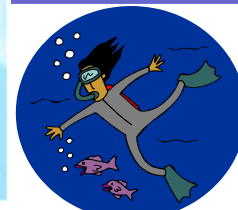

## Miami Wreck Weekend – June 27-28



A blast from the past!!!! Are you looking to do something different? Want to try some dives that maybe you have never done before or some old haunts that you have not seen in a while? Or are you just like me and looking for an excuse to get wet :-) Boy, does the club have something for you. This is a trip the club use to run a long time ago and with all the GREAT diving in Miami, we really need to start running it again. So now is your chance. Sign up early to ensure that you get one of the slots.

We have two dive trips planned over the weekend – Saturday afternoon and Sunday Morning. Will we be diving w/ RJ Diving Ventures. For those of you that have dove w/ Capt. Mike before, I am sure you will agree... **BEST BOAT IN FLORIDA!!!!** The boat is a 46 feet long custom built Newton. Almost the exact same boat we dove in Little Cayman. She is fast, comfortable, and set up for **DIVERS!** And the captain and crew are always a pleasure to dive with.

On Saturday afternoon, we will be diving one of the most famous wrecks in Miami – “The Tortuga”. She is a 165 foot steel ship that was sunk in April 1995. The difference between this wreck and others is that this particular ship was purchased by a movie company to be sunk on purpose for the movie Fair Game starring Cindy Crawford and William Baldwin. In the climactic scene at the end of the movie, the entire detonation and sinking of the Tortuga was documented as the characters portrayed by the two stars narrowly escape from the ship with their lives. And best of all, she is nearly completely in in-fact. Lots of swim throughs and tons of life on her.

The wreck is a classic one, sitting completely upright in 100 feet of water. One of its distinctive features is the twin props which are totally intact making a great photographic opportunity. While the ship can be explored in 80 feet of water, this is considered an Advanced Dive. Please make sure you have the appropriate experience and certifications before you sign up. The second dive of the afternoon will be a reef.

Then on Sunday morning we are heading over to a wreck called the “Belcher Barge”. This 195-ft steel barge was sunk near Key Biscayne in November 1985 when four explosions opened its corners. The barge turned over on its way to the bottom. Experienced divers can swim inside the entire length, passing through the holes that were cut in the bulkheads; a flash light and safety reel is recommended. The *Belzona One, Two & Three* are close by and form a wreck trek. Ghostly spotted eagle rays and a large stingray are often resident. The depth on this dive is 60 feet. Which should give us plenty of bottom time to explore all the wrecks.

For our last dive of the weekend, we will be doing a new site. One that I bet most of us have not dove before... Or any other site like it I bet.... The “Neptune Memorial Reef”. Yes, an un-





derwater cemetery! From the people I have talked too that have dove it, I hear it is a unique experience and actually an **AWESOME** dive. It is a re-creation of the legendary Lost City and will be the largest man-made reef of its type in the world. Covering over 16 acres of ocean floor, The Neptune Memorial Reef will offer room for more than 125,000 remains, and become a "living city" that will act as a sanctuary for marine life to converge and thrive. The site is only 40 feet deep and already has a lot of architecture to explore.

The price for the dives will be \$120 (includes both trips). Nitrox and air rentals will be available if needed. As for lodging on Saturday night, we will have a location identified as we get closer. But it will be an optional part of the package. Captain Mike is recommending the Best Western. It runs about 100 per room. So plan on about another 50 dollars unless you want to make your own arrangements (i.e., have hotel points you can use). But I always tell people, it is more fun to stay with the group. We always have a group activity during the evening.

# KNOW YOUR LIMITATIONS

Know your Limitations. I bet you have heard that somewhere before, but your safety not to mention your pleasure in diving are dependent on it. The Dive Club's purpose is presenting diving opportunities to the membership and to act as a facilitator to organize the opportunity for a diving experience. It is the responsibility of the member to make sure their knowledge and experience are up to the requirements of the dive. No one knows your limitations better than you do and when in doubt err on the side of safety. If you are interested in a dive but unsure of the demands of the dive, your best resource is the dive operator. Contact the dive facility personnel and find out what the conditions are likely to be like and what is the worst condition you can expect. Dive conditions can vary greatly at a particular location, For example, any dive in West Palm Bch could have anywhere from > 100 ft visibility, no current and calm water to < 10 ft visibility and 3 knots of current and 6 ft seas. You need to make sure your prepared to deal with not only the ideal conditions, but the worst conditions as well. Find out what the dive operators policy is on how bad it has to be before they will cancel a trip and their refund policy. We all want to progress in our abilities, but progression should be done in small steps. If you know a dive may challenge your abilities, arrange to buddy up with a more experienced diver that can help you out. That is one of the advantages of belonging to a dive club, take the time at the meetings to get to know and make friends with others in the club and learn from the experiences of others. We want you to have a safe and enjoyable diving experience. Not a horror story to pass on, but the responsibility for it is ultimately yours. We have an ambitious dive schedule planned for this year, some of the dives are going to require advanced skills , so pick and choose the dives your comfortable with and dive safely. Contact your local Dive Shop about advancing your education with more advanced dive classes. Be safe and let's go diving.
